Spring Workshop

We have an excellent watercolorist and instructor coming to do our Spring Workshop, Kateri Ewing. It will be held at La Poste, Perry on May 6-7-8, 2019. The chickadee above is hers.



I have taken three on-line classes taught by Kateri and I enjoyed learning about color theory and working with a limited palette.

In previous conversations with IWS members as well as submissions of comments during our Annual Luncheon, the request to bring a watercolorist that can paint birds has been noted. Kateri is that

instructor. Also, if you have ever been interested in botanicals, we will be working on that as well.

Following is a description of the workshop. It will be a combination of "creative exploration and tried and true techniques". This should be quite different than other previous workshops we have had.

The Joys Of Watercolor: Play, Process and Product, a 3-day watercolor exploration with Kateri Ewing

Join Kateri Ewing for a three day creative exploration of what it means to be a watercolorist with beginner's mind. Based on Kateri's own daily work as a professional artist, our mornings will be spent in creative and meditative play, discovering the beauty and possibilities of different tools and materials and many ways to get our creative juices flowing. Before lunch we will get into techniques and

theory that encourage process over product, and ease our way into discussions about the how and why of our own artistc practice. After lunch it's all about professional product; over three afternoons, we will be creating a watercolor painting of a realistic song bird on a flowering branch.

Kateri hopes to share her philosophy of creative practice as a watercolorist, and the importance of finding our own voice and making time to simply play, as well as her tried and true techniques for creating a sense of realism in her work, and that spark of life that gives her birds the feeling that they will fly off the page at any moment. Join Kateri for a dynamic three days of falling in love with our watercolor practice all over again.

Watercolor Glossary of Terms:

If you are new or a veteran watercolorist, it is important to know and understand the definition of some common terms that we come across when we read articles or listen to watercolorist presentations. The following terms are an excerpt from The Watercolor Bible by Joe Garcia (North Light Books, 2006).

TERM	DEFINITION	TERM	DEFINITION
analogous colors:	colors that are closely related on the color wheel	gradated wash:	a wash in which the value gradually changes from dark to light
casein:	a fast-drying, water-soluble paint derived from milk protein, or casein	granulation:	speckled effect when coarse pigment settles into the paper indentations as the paint dries
charging:	technique that involves mixing two or more colors directly on the paper instead of premixing on a palette	gouache (or body color):	an opaque watercolor that can be applied thick or thin
cold-pressed paper:	lightly textured paper that absorbs paint and water	hard edge:	the outer perimeter of a shape or series of shapes, sharply defined
complementary colors:	colors directly across from each other on the color wheel	hot-pressed paper:	smooth, slick paper that doesn't easily absorb paint and water
drybrush technique:	brushwork done on the dry surface of the paper	hue:	a color's common name (for example, cadmium red)
flat wash:	brushing successive strokes of color on a wet or dry surface, with each stroke placed next to the other, to create an even layer of color	intensity:	a color's saturation, brightness or strength
glazing:	applying thin, transparent washes of one color over another color	layering:	applying premixed colors over another wash to change its value or intensity

lifting paint:	a technique for removing paint from a surface with a brush, paper towel or tissue in order to correct mistakes, develop textures, create highlights or change values	staining colors:	colors that absorb into the paper before the water has had a chance to evaporate; they're difficult to lift and will leave a stain on the paper
lost and found edges:	also called broken or inferred edges; used to create and suggest movement	temperature:	the warmness or coolness of a color, depending on where the color is situated on the color wheel
masking fluid:	liquid latex used to preserve the white of the paper and to create textures	tint:	created by adding water to the original color; the more water that's added, the weaker the intensity
palette:	surface on which watercolors are mixed and/or stored	transparent paint:	consists of pigment mixed with gum arabic, glycerin and a wetting agent
palette knife:	small spatula-style knife used to apply or remove paint, or to add texture	value:	a color's relative lightness or darkness
pan paint:	small cakes of watercolor paint that come in half-pan or whole-pan sizes	variegated wash:	type of wet-into-wet wash that involves placing colors side by side and then mixing and blending them along their edges
pigment:	dry coloring matter, usually an insoluble powder, that's mixed with water and gum Arabic to create paint	wet-into-dry wash:	also known as a glaze or layering wash; a wash that's applied to a dry surface
rough paper:	heavily textured paper	wet-into-wet wash:	painting on a wet surface and letting colors blend as they may; looks strong and vibrant while wet but loses intensity when the colors dry
soft edge:	fading or disappearing edge	YUPO:	a "plastic" paper that doesn't easily absorb paint and water
scrubbing:	a dry-brush technique used to lift paint from or add color to an area of the surface
